Greetings Blessed Ones,

I truly hope this note finds you and your loved ones well and adapting to the new and fluid realities that emerge daily. You are a blessed family of faith, and Mona and I are privileged to be a part of this Circle.

Our Lenten Theme was, and continues to be "Portals, a Journey of Discovery." We have certainly had the opportunity to enter some new and sometimes scary portals in the last several weeks. The first two Portals we opened were the Portal of Introspection and the Portal of Faith. Collectively on Ash Wednesday and on the First Sunday of Lent we prayed for the strength and the time to look inwardly this Lenten Season. Slow down a little bit, engage ourselves, slowly, quietly but for sure on our own terms. Goodness, our prayers were certainly answered! But not how we ever could have imagined. We will continue to walk as we have with courage, dignity and honor, respecting our Baptismal Vows to respect the dignity of every human being. We will all emerge from our time in the Desert with a new clarity and sense of purpose to continue on our Jesus Movement mission to "Love one another as Christ loves us."

In last Sunday's Gospel, The Story of the Woman at the Well," one of the powerful images and lessons was that the Samaritan woman left her jug behind at the well. She engaged Jesus face to face and she left her old life, and her water jug, behind. We are challenged in these new times to also leave huge pieces of our old lives behind, as we continue to engage Jesus face to face, in response to our new social realities, and find new and exciting ways to live our All Saints Mission to Gather Transform and Send.
