

## Ash Wednesday Message


"Our Walk Home Begins...changing course"

Greetings Blessed Ones and welcome to again to All Saints. Tonight, we begin the season of Lent, and it just feels weird to me. The spiritual and emotional "pivot" required from yesterday to today...from the joy and brightness, the starriness of Epiphany to the traditional "starkness" of Lent is almost too much for me. It is a perfect example of the liturgical "bipolarity" of the Church Year. Here we were, joyfully cruising through the Epiphany Season together, learning and following the star and then, bam!
